From Your President

Hope everyone got a chance to enjoy the 4th of July. The Ammo community is being impacted by the budget crunch as TDYs for training have been stopped and there's even been discussion of closing down the AFCOMAC school house if things get much worse. Many of the normal meetings and conferences have already been canceled for FY2013. Some of our Ammo troops are going to be impacted by rollback of the high year of tenure; so we need to engage those that will be at risk in the next couple years to ensure they understand there's nothing as a supervisor you can do. There are some that have tested for the last time and will be forced out and more that will be testing for the last time in the coming test cycle. If they haven't completed their CCAF and additional college courses they are going to find it tough in the job market as many of the DoD industry establishments are cutting back as well. This month civil servants will begin the unheard of process of not being allowed to work one day a week in any capacity to offset the budget. Thousands of National Guard troops will be furloughed one day a week for the next three months as well. Many of the weapon systems and flying hour programs are impacted as well. I'll repeat something I stated in my last newsletter "During budget cut drills no one is a winner; everyone suffers at some level. It's during these times we as leaders must keep our Ammo troops informed of the pending actions that could impact them personally."

I put a motion before the ACA BOD to make a minor change to our constitution to better align with the way we as an organization operate. For many years the treasurer has been signing the checks for payments or donations to support the Ammo community; our constitution required two ACA BOD members sign the checks. The ACA BOD is comprised of members spread out across the United States; whereas in the beginning most BOD members were within a few miles of each other. Just so everyone knows how we approve expenditures a motion is presented to the ACA BOD and the ACA BOD members vote either in favor or against. Only if the motion is approved will our treasurer then send a check.

Based on the way we have been operating for several years including before I became president, we had been operating with the treasurer being able to sign checks, make payments on behalf of the organization. In all cases the ACA BOD has been a part of that decision with minor exceptions of paying for the cost of maintaining the website or other associated annual fees.

Over the past few months we have received more bad news than good news. Several of our Ammo brothers have made their last Ammo Call; we extend our deepest thoughts and prayers to their families. You can read more in the Last Ammo Call section of the newsletter. For some good news I've been in email contact with Chuck Norton after his surgery and he is doing very well; in fact he's been enjoying operating his tractor helping the neighbor remove downed trees.


We got some great inputs from our chapters for this edition. We still need historical inputs and old and new Ammo related pictures to share with the rest of the Ammo community.

Munitions systems student earns ACE award

6/18/2013 - **SHEPPARD AIR FORCE BASE, Texas** -- A non-commissioned officer has lived up to his name and found his center of gravity grounded in an achievement that few rarely see.

For Staff Sgt. Jeffrey Plumb, 363rd Training Squadron munitions systems apprentice, academic excellence was achieved on a rare level as he earned the ACE award June 12.

The ACE award is given for an individual who achieves a 100 percent grade average throughout the entire length of the course. There are 43 training days in the munitions systems training.

"It's a big accomplishment," Plumb said. "It feels good."

Plumb, who expressed satisfaction with his performance, wanted to represent his unit in the best manner possible.

"I wanted to make the (Air) National Guard proud," he said.

The camaraderie and sense of belonging is one of Plumb's favorite aspects of being in the career field he enjoys being in.

"Our ammo troops are top-notch," he said. "They make you feel like family."

In a job that has potentially life altering decisions, Plumb feels that his performance in the schoolhouse is what will be required of him on the daily basis when he goes back to his home unit.

"You've got to be prepared if you're going to deliver munitions on bad people," he said. "This is serious stuff."

Even after scoring a 100 percent average throughout the course, Plumb feels the need to better himself.

"It puts me on a good footing," he said. "Everybody has got to improve and upgrade; if you're not ready for that, it reflects badly."

As Plumb prepared to graduate he felt assured that he could do his job well.

"Anything I do," he said, "I do to the best of my abilities."



Plumb plans on taking his newly found talent back to Joint Base Andrews, Md., where he is a member of the 113th Wing, District of Columbia Air National Guard.

Piper Wilhide Update

Piper Wilhide was born on September 17, 2012 weighing in 7 lbs. 12 oz and 20 inches long. She had a head full of hair and instantly had her parents wrapped around her finger. At such a young age, Piper has been through more things than most adults. On October 17, 2012 our life changed. My husband's life changed. Our family's lives changed. Our precious Piper, who just days earlier was told she had a perfect 2 week checkup was diagnosed with Neuroblastoma at 4 weeks old. We quickly absorbed that Piper wasn't the only one with cancer; this disease was going to affect and change all of our lives. The battle had begun.



She has been in and out of the hospital and has had follow up visits weekly at her clinic almost an hour away from home almost her entire life. She underwent 4 surgeries; 2 of them were major surgeries. She went through months of chemotherapy, 6 rounds to be exact. Currently Piper is considered NED, no evidence of disease. Doctors do not use the term "cancer free" because odds of cancer returning remains high and she must hit the "five year mark" to be put into a different category where the cancer has slimmer chances of returning. She constantly has monthly check ups of urine and blood. She will be under extremely close observation for the next 6 years, plus.

Our hearts are full of gratitude and sincere appreciation for the endless acts of kindness shown to our family. At the end of the day, nothing matters more than the love you feel from family, friends and even strangers. Through regular checkups, scans and detailed testing, Piper's amazing oncology team and surgeons will continue to give Piper the best care possible so her "monster" does not return. Neuroblastoma is a rare cancer, and is among the top three most deadliest cancers. Piper is a true fighter and continues to show unimaginable strength and courage!

To Date: Piper will undergo her 3 month scans July 10th, 11th, and 12th, 2013. She will have a MIBG injection, MRI, and MIBG scans all three days. We will find out her results Friday at her clinic visit after her scans. She is sedated for all procedures and they last several hours. We continue to pray that her scans will remain clear and we hear the words "NED" on Friday the 12th.
