Greetings to all. Hope you are ready for the upcoming Summer heat and fire season, seems many areas have already had their share of both already.

For those of you coming out here for the Reunion, I'd like to say **Thank You** for getting your Signup Sheets and \$\$ sent in. I'd also like to offer the following schedule and event information as we now have it lined up. Keep in mind the time remaining until the 15th of October and world events that might possibly "muck" things up between now and then. Barring any of those happening, our Reunion calendar looks like this:

Colorado has had a long lasting State Partnership with the country of Jordan. As part of this partnership, this year we had a




The crews were evaluated for time and overall performance during an aircraft generation, an alert scramble, a load competition, and a live drop event.

LAST AMMO CALL

Airman 1st Class Nicholas Nadeja

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy — An airman assigned to the 31st Munitions Squadron died





while hiking in the mountains above Aviano Air Base. The 31st Fighter Wing identified him as Airman 1st Class Nicholas J. Nadeja, a line delivery crewmember. "Airman 1st Class Nadeja was an outstanding airman and a valued member of our Aviano family," Brig. Gen. Jon A. Norman, the wing commander, said, according to a Wing news release. "Our thoughts and prayers go out to the family and loved ones affected by this loss."

Nadeja is the second member of the squadron to die in the last 10 days. Staff Sgt. Heber Rosales died March 26 while undergoing treatment at the base hospital.

Staff Sergeant Aaron Parker

Staff Sergeant Aaron Parker was in Tremonton, Utah. He was assigned to the 18th Munitions SQ, Kadena Air Base, Okinawa Japan. He remained there for 3 years and worked as an ISO Maintenance Fabrication Crew Member and TARRP Crew Member. In November of 2009 Sergeant Parker deployed to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and forward deployed with the 33rd Special Operations Sq. Sergeant Parker and his family arrived at Luke Air Force Base, October 5, 2011. While assigned to the 56th Equipment Maintenance Squadron he served as a Conventional Munitions Maintenance Crew Chief. During his time at Luke, Sergeant Parker opted to cross-train and successfully completed training into Special Missions Aviation aboard CV-22 Osprey and had an assignment to Hurlbert Field, Florida.

SSgt HEBER ROSALES

Staff Sergeant Heber Rosales served as the Bay Chief for the Munitions Support Equipment Section, 31st Munitions Squadron, Aviano Air Base, Italy. Sergeant Rosales was born in El Paso Texas, on 21 November 1986.
