
Enjoy the Fall weather, stay well and be extra safe out there.

From the Treasurer:

As of 15 Aug 2017, ACA membership reached a new all-time of 238 members.



DONATIONS, TAX EXEMPTION, AND DEDUCTIBLE CONTRIBUTIONS

I wanted to remind membership about our Tax Exemption and Deductible Contribution ability.

Dues and donations are about our only income aside from the few dollars interest we earn on our accounts. To date we have had \$539 in donations made to the ACA in 2017. That's \$\$\$ given to us. My thanks to all who donated.

Plus we have donated a total of \$2,514 to a variety of Ammo causes namely the CMSgt Gauvin Scholarship Winner and the fund via the SMMC, four Ammo Bowls, and the Holiday Care Packages for Troops program administered by the Mid Atlantic Chapter. This does not include the cost of coins presented to AFCOMAC or School House award winners. This is \$\$\$ we gave to others so far this year.

We qualify in the eyes of the IRS as an <u>IRC 501 (c) (19) Tax-Exempt Organization</u> because <u>75 percent</u> of our members are past or present members of the Armed Forces of the United States. This makes us <u>TAX EXEMPT</u>.

To take it a step further we are also considered as a <u>IRC 170(c)(3)</u> <u>War Veterans Organization</u> because <u>90</u> <u>percent</u> of our members are war veterans and for the purposes set forth in our ACA Constitution which was reviewed by the IRS. This makes our Donors Donations <u>TAX DEDUCTIBLE</u>.

If you are a relatively new member than you remember upon joining we asked you for your Date of Enlistment and Date of Retirement, it is through these dates that we can attest to the 75% and the 90% marks by comparing your time in service against the periods of war specified in U.S.C. 38. We have been doing a good job in collecting these dates on new members since 2013 but we have gaps on many older members. We may be asking for your dates soon if we don't have them.

We are approaching the last quarter of the year and it is a perfect time to think about any contributions you might like to make in 2017 especially those that might be tax deductible. Also, if you are still working and you think you might want to make a donation, it might be a good time to ask your employer if they do an employee match on contributions to tax deductible organizations!



AMMO in the News

F-35A to fly during WSEP; 388th MXS Munitions Flight builds bombs for evaluations

Ammo Airmen here spent the first week of August building munitions for evaluation testing. The 388th Maintenance Squadron Munitions Flight built over 50 GBU-31 and GBU-12 bombs for employment by Hill AFB's F-35As during this WSEP exercise.

Munitions Builds Underway



Airmen assigned to the 388th Maintenance Squadron Munitions Flight assemble GBU-31 bombs at Hill Air Force Base, Aug. 1. The 2,000-pound bombs will be dropped by Hill AFB's F-35A Lightning II aircraft at the Utah Test and Training Range during Combat Hammer, an evaluation which determines the effectiveness, maintainability, suitability, and accuracy of precision-guided munitions and other high technology air-to-ground weapons. The fact that operational F-35As are participating in WSEP for the first time is not lost on the 388th MXS Munitions Flight.

"Our Airmen are definitely aware that what they're doing for this WSEP evaluation is going to directly impact the Air Force and the F-35," said Tech. Sgt. Theopolis Austin, a munitions crew chief assigned to the 388th MXS Munitions Flight, "so we're highly excited to be involved and to get our munitions out there and onto the jets."

While the evaluation exercises are critical to readiness and provide valuable information to Air Force leadership, 388th MXS Munitions Flight Airmen are well prepared.

"Our build operations are actually no different," said Austin, talking about the difference between building munitions for day-to-day operations and for WSEP. "As far as we're concerned, this is regular everyday business."

"National USAF AMMO Day"

Proclamation.

The AMMO Veterans Association and the AMMO Chiefs Association are both pleased to announce the kickoff of "National USAF AMMO Day" (or more simply known as "AMMO Day") to be held annually on the 4th of December beginning in 2018, contingent on whether the day can be approved and finalized to be included in the National Registry.

Selection of this day was chosen because the 4th of December happens to be "Saint Barbara's Day" the patron Saint of armourers, military engineers, gunsmiths, tunnellers, miners and anyone else who worked with cannon and explosives. St. Barbara is invoked against thunder and lightning and all accidents arising from explosions of gunpowder. St. Barbara's day is celebrated by the British (Royal Artillery, RAF Armourers, Royal Engineers), Australian (Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery, (RAAF Armourers), Canadian Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technicians (EOD), Canadian Air Force Armourers, Royal Canadian Artillery, Canadian Military Field Engineers, Royal Canadian Navy Weapons Engineering Technicians, New Zealand (RNZN) Gunners Branch, RNZA, Royal New Zealand Army Ordnance Corps, RNZAF Armourers) armed forces. Additionally, this day is celebrated by Irish Defence Forces Artillery Regiments, Norwegian Armed Forces Artillery Battalions, United States Army and Marine Corps Field and Air Defense Artillery, many Marine Corps Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technicians and last, but not least, St. Barbara is also the patron saint of US Navy and Marine Corps Aviation Ordnance men and women.

Therefore it is further proclaimed that **United States Air Force AMMO Troops** past and present who held, or are now serving in, Air Force Specialty Codes 461 and 2W0 (Munitions Systems Specialists) are equally qualified candidates to have their USAF Specialty added to this impressive listing of Foreign and Domestic Ordnance & Explosive orientated Military and Civilian occupations / organizations all holding this day in such high reverence.

The primary purpose of this day is to bring all **AMMO Troops** together who have served for any length of time, and those who have either Retired or are now on Active Duty to participate in a day of camaraderie and celebration. AMMO Call's, softball games, horseshoes, social gatherings / visiting with new

/old AMMO troops and their families, enjoying some cold beer and throwing some meat on the grill are but a few of the ways envisioned to do this. 



AMMO Heritage – RAF Woodbridge...

Former Home of America's A-10 tank-buster jets

RAF Woodbridge was used as a station for A-10 'Tank Buster' planes during the Cold War but it is now rotting. USAF returned it to British Ministry of Defence in 1993; site will be demolished in 2027. A group of aviation experts have provided a fascinating insight into the dilapidated former US air base.

The USAF returned control of Woodbridge to the UK Ministry of Defence and since 2006 it has been split up and the two parts officially renamed as Woodbridge Airfield and Rock Barracks, with a group of aviation experts going behind the scenes to reveal its secrets. In November last year the Ministry of Defense announced that the site would close in 2027.

A series of stunning pictures reveal an abandoned airbase in the heart of Suffolk which has been left to rot for 24 years since it was abandoned by the United States Airforce after the Cold War.

The images show decaying and crumbling aircraft hangars on the site of RAF Woodbridge, a military airfield constructed in 1943 to assist damaged aircraft returning from raids over Hitler's Germany.

The base - to the east of the eponymous riverside town - was later taken over by the United States Airforce during the Cold War with the legendary A-10 'Tank-Buster' bombers stationed there.

But its hangars are now gathering dust, paint peeling from the decaying walls with just a pair of pigeons calling them home.

The last of the A-10s departed Woodbridge 24 years ago in August 1993 and the airfield was closed as a US military facility.

The airfield has been divided into two parts since the United States Airforce left, Woodbridge Airfield and Rock Barracks. The former is used by Army Air Corps for training and the latter are home to the 23 Engineer Regiment (Air Assault) of the Royal Engineers

RAF WOODBRIDGE DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR AND COLD WAR

RAF Woodbridge was first constructed in 1943 to repair fighter planes that were returning from bombing raids on Hitler's Germany.

Because it was designed for struggling planes to land on, the runways were built with extra-long runways - just like fellow repair sites RAF Manston in Kent and RAF Carnaby in Yorkshire.

Following the end of the Second World War, tensions between America and the Soviet Union began to rise after the publication of the Truman Doctrine, a policy document pledging to aid all countries threatened by the USSR's expansion across Eastern Europe and Asia.

RAF Woodbridge was offered to the United States Airforce in 1952, with President Harry Truman seeking to expand its military presence across America's western European allies as tensions with the Soviets increased.

The 79th Fighter-Bomber Squadron was the first from the US to use the airfield, taking to the skies on October 1 of that year. Woodbridge was operated as twin base with RAF Bentwaters, also in Suffolk, and as a single unit with Bentwaters under the 81st Tactical Fighter Wing.

The first A-10 Thunderbolt was deployed from Woodbridge in 1979, which led to an expansion of the 81st TFW was expanded. For more than 50 years US planes were stationed in Suffolk, and USAF presence at Woodbridge was gradually phased down following the end of the Cold War and the disbanding of the USSR. The 81st TFW was officially inactivated on 1 July 1993.

It has now been split into two sections, Woodbridge Airfield and Rock Barracks - the former is used for training exercises despite its dilapidated state and the latter is home to a Royal Engineers regiment. Woodbridge is also open to the public for track days for cars, but the Ministry of Defense announced in November the site would close in 2027.
