From The Secretary:

Greetings to all, hope everyone enjoyed their Holidays/vacations with family and friends - peacefully and safely. We're well into the New Year and it will be a busy one for the ACA. One of the things we need to address soon is the loss of many of our board members - specifically:

Van Ray is stepping down 31 December at the end of his 4 year term.

Mike Robertson is also stepping down 31 December at the end of his 4 year term.

My 8 year term as Secretary is also up 31 December.

Mike Roylance has served 6 years and has decided to stay for 2 more to meet the maximum term allowed if agreeable to all.

Fred O'Hern's 8 year term is up and he has also voluntarily extended his tenure out to 31 December, 2021.

Bart Ivy's 8 year Director at Large term is up;

"Dusty" Rhodes and John Ray are also stepping down from Director at Large positions at the end of their 4 year terms.

We (the BOD) are considering a revision to our Constitutions Election process to help reduce / eliminate such a big loss of Board continuity in the future. We would first begin by moving our nomination and voting process forward to this summer giving us all a bit more time to put together a broader spread of viable candidates. We would probably start the process in the July - August time frame vice waiting until October. As in the past, we would ask for volunteers from, and nominations for, any eligible ACA member. We would also ask each of the Chapters to nominate members from their respective memberships for the BOD openings, presenting them the opportunity for representation on the BOD with one of their own. Those elected will begin their terms 1 January, 2020.

The remaining vacancies (Treasurer & Chief at Arms) at the end of Mike and Fred's voluntary extensions would require those positions to be voted on / filled in the Fall of 2021 with those elected taking office the 1st of January, 2022. This approach (holding elections every two years) will require changes to the Constitution, concurrence of the BOD and at least 25% of the general membership voting in favor. It'll work, the difficult part will be convincing a couple more current BOD members to extend out for another 2 years! I would welcome anyone's thoughts on this real soon - - before we decide to put it all up for a formal motion / vote.

For those of you who pay dues annually and who have not yet done so are reminded you have been removed from the current and active membership rolls as of 31 January. I'm sure some of you have merrily forgotten it's that time of year again, some others have been in arrears for some time and we'd sure like to have you all back "in the fold." To be reinstated / brought up to date simply send Mike or I a \$25.00 check for your 2019 dues **OR** convert to Lifetime membership by paying whatever your remaining balance is. If you're not sure of the amount remaining for lifetime membership drop Mike or I an email and we'll let you know. Remember, you can now go to the ammochiefs.com website and use the PayPal link to make your payment. Since Mike recently went out to all our Annual Dues paying members reminding them of this option, many have taken advantage of it and we thank you much for doing so.

Finally, I wish you and yours an enjoyable Spring and Summer, stay healthy and be safe.



We presented the results of the voting for Chapter Vice President and Rich Pennington is our new Vice President. Dave Nixon served superbly in this capacity the past 2 years. His insight and participation in all of our programs set the bar high.

We reviewed four Sharp Ammo Troop packages and SrA Allen A. Jenlink of the 20 EMS at Shaw AFB was the winner. Jack Miller sent a \$100.00 Visa card, chapter coin, and certificate to his flight for presentation.


AMMO Heritage Memorial

At the last AMMO Chiefs Association Reunion held in Branson MO in October 2018 there was a proposal made to consider development of an AMMO Memorial. Discussion ensued and it was agreed that any type action would need to garner the support of the Ammo Community as a whole, active duty, guard, reserve, and retired. The ACA is not the owner of this proposal but some of its members have agreed to help guide its initial formation. The intent of this document is to reach out to all those in the Ammo Community and to open constructive discussions, seek comments and hear suggestions on the feasibility and support for such a Memorial.

Further we believe a standalone non-profit organization with a committee to oversee the project will ensure success.

The scope of this initiative is estimated to be on par, but no smaller than something like the Military Working Dog Teams National Monument located at Lackland AFB in San Antonio TX.

Our Goal is to preserve the AMMO Heritage with a Monument or Memorial that depicts or symbolizes the efforts of the USAF Munitions Systems Career Field (461/2WO) personnel and their achievements.



- Acknowledge the history of ordnance and specifically the impact of munitions personnel on the use of airpower.
- Recognize the achievements in USAF Airpower and the influence AMMO has had on these achievements.
- Memorialize the grit and determination the field has had to endure in conflicts over the years.
- Become a historical monument to the past and touchstone for the future
- Link the past to the present and enable people to remember and respect the sacrifice of those who participated in or were part of the Munitions Maintenance career field.

It should be noted that although the idea for the AMMO

Memorial was conceived within the ACA, we are not to be considered the "owners" of it. When completed, "Ownership" of the Memorial will belong to all USAF AMMO Troops, past, present and future.

Having said that, we are concentrating on creation of a standalone committee to oversee and ensure the Memorials success. Ideally the committee's structure would include a cross section of AMMO Troops from all USAF organizational levels. We are looking for participation from everyone; Active, Guard, Reserve and including veterans associations such as the AMMO Chiefs Association and the AMMO Veterans Association and their members.

In mid-October, the U.S. Air Force received its largest shipment of ordnance since the <u>bombing of Yugoslavia</u> in the late 1990s. The measure is part of a lockstep approach by <u>U.S. Air Forces in Europe</u> and U.S. European Command to rearm the continent and bolster its deterrence posture.

Roughly 100 containers filled with munitions rolled into <u>Ramstein Air Base</u> in Germany this month. "A variety of munitions in approximately 100 containers were received," Auburn Davis, an Air Forces in Europe spokeswoman, said. "For operational security reasons, we cannot discuss specific numbers of items, nor the specifics of the items."

Davis added that she could not get into the specifics regarding container size, or any other shipment details. Regardless, the shipment is reportedly very large.

Master Sgt. David Head, a section chief with the 86th Munitions Squadron at Ramstein, said in a press release that a delivery of this magnitude has not taken place since the late 20th century.

"This is the largest shipment of its kind since Operation Allied Force, which took place in 1999," he said, referring to a two-month NATO campaign bombing Serbian forces to prevent ethnic cleansing during the <u>Kosovo War</u>. "The munitions that we received will be used for future theater operations and the evolving U.S. European Command presence," Head added.

The stockpile will be used to support NATO's European Deterrence Initiative and augment the Air Force's war reserve materiel in Europe, according to a Ramstein Air Base statement. The <u>European Deterrence Initiative</u>, or EDI, began in 2014 — several months after <u>Russia's annexation of Crimea</u> — to deter Russian aggression against its neighboring countries. The EDI aims to increase the U.S. military's responsiveness to a crisis on the continent by stockpiling ammunition, fuel and equipment at strategic locations. War reserve materiel, meanwhile, are munitions stockpiles designed to last for a theater of operations until resupply at wartime rates is established.



The effort to counter Russian aggression in Europe is growing daily

Europe continues to be a growth point for the Air Force as concerns about Russian intentions mount. International exercises, base funding and missions on the continent are all on an upward swing.

Since 2014, stockpiling weaponry has been a growth point for U.S. defense policy in Europe, as it rehabilitates a military posture that deteriorated after the conclusion of the Cold War. Master Sgt. Arthur Myrick, a munitions flight chief with the 86th, said that the munitions will also play a major role outside the European continent.

"We're a major airlift hub for U.S. Air Forces in Europe-Air Forces Africa, so our main job is to get munitions where they need to be on time," Myrick said. "These are real-world munitions to fulfill real-world objectives." "That's the reason we are downloading these things, to make sure we have the capability to move the fight forward if need be," he added.

Air Forces in Europe have played an important role in supplying munitions for U.S. military campaigns in the Middle East, to include airstrikes in Libya, Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan. Now, a focus on Europe's own needs appears to be the main motive for the stockpile replenishment. Across Europe, the Air Force has also been reinforcing its basing posture. The Pentagon has pushed funds out to make significant airfield improvements in Eastern Europe, such as new refueling infrastructure, parking aprons and taxiways in countries like Estonia and Hungary.



Perry Donald Jones, husband of Deloris "Jeannie" Jones, born October 8, 1931, to Ida Johnson Jones and Benjamin Smiley Jones, joined his heavenly Father on December 17, 2018. He was a true southern gentleman of character and compassion. He was a man of faith that loved God and his family. He especially adored his wife of 57 years.

Perry believed in professionalism, hard work, fairness, and was respected by all that knew and worked with him. He led by example, showing unconditional love, understanding, selfless generosity and kindness. He was a decorated member of the U.S. Air Force for 23 years. The majority of his military career was spent in Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Safety. He retired as CMSgt -- the youngest to ever obtain this rank.
