In my last article I talked about the AMMO Heritage Memorial program the ACA has in its strategic goals. They are now referring to the effort as the AMMO Heritage Monument. I thought it appropriate to give everyone an update on other memorial initiatives the ACA has undertaken. It all started in late 2009, when the ACA embarked on the challenge to honor and pay tribute to the AMMO community, past, present and future. To accomplish this, they decided to acquire AMMO Memorial plaques.



The acquisition of the plaques was initiated by the Midwest Chapter on behalf of the ACA. The design and plaques were created by the Dayton Stencil company in Dayton, OH. The first two plaques were delivered in May 2010. The first plaque was presented to the National Museum of the United States Air Force. The second plaque was delivered to Chief Johnny Long and presented to The Armament Museum at Eglin.

In July 2011, it was decided to acquire two more plaques. Through the efforts of Chief Fred O'Hern one plaque was delivered to Ron Holliday and presented to the Wings Over the Rockies Museum in Denver, CO. The other was shipped to

CMSgt Grant Embrey and is now displayed at the Air Force Enlisted Heritage Hall at the Gunter Annex, AL.

So, the ACA continues to pay tribute to the AF AMMO community. To those who have contributed to the AMMO Heritage Monument fund – I thank you. To those who have donated their time to make it a reality by supporting the committee, I appreciate you stepping up.

On another note, we are looking for volunteers interested in filling some very big shoes: our Treasurer's term in office expires at the end of 2021 so we are actively looking for his replacement. If you are interested in filling this position, please contact myself or any BOD member.

Lastly, a noteworthy milestone - this October marks the 20th anniversary of our ACA Reunion and we'll celebrate accordingly during our next reunion in Tucson, AZ.

Since the start of the pandemic in March 2020, the Chapter's fundraising ability has ground to a halt. Based on this premise, the Chapter notified the ACA to temporarily suspend this year's summer care package program until further notice. The pandemic restrictions are coming down so things should improve in the near future. Only time will tell. The Chapter plans to readdress resuming the summer program in 2022. However, the Chapter will continue to support the 2021 Holiday care package program.

The Chapter sent "Get Well" cards to Phil Kennedy, recovering from back surgery and to Yvonne Watts, recovering from a broken arm. Both are healing and doing well.

After many, many years of dedicated and faithful service to the Chapter as Secretary-Treasurer, Bill McCullough has decided to call it a day...effective immediately. The Chief Master Sergeant (CMSgt) Richard A. Gauvin AMMO Troop Memorial Fund was founded in June 1998 by Class 9806 as a continuing class legacy to pay tribute to Chief Gauvin for his selfless contributions to his country and the AMMO community. Class 9806 contributed the initial funds in the amount of \$400.00, obtained through personal contributions by class members. All class members agreed the fund should be established to award scholarships to children of munitions personnel who held AFSC 461XX, 465XX or 2WOX1 on active, reserve, or ANG duty in the service of the USAF.

The Air Force Combat Ammunition Center (AFCOMAC) Senior Staff will administer the scholarship fund. All future AFCOMAC classes will have the opportunity to raise funds and contribute to expanding the scholarship fund.

The USAF Major Command Functional Managers who act as the AFCOMAC Board of Advisors (BOA) will be the Scholarship Selection Committee to review, approve, and decide on the amount awarded to each applicant. All scholarship applicants will submit their applications prior to 1 June of each year.

The AMMO Chiefs Association (ACA) contributes \$500 annually directly to the AFCOMAC BOA selected recipient of the Chief Gauvin Memorial Scholarship.

#### ACA MEMORIAL PAVER PROGRAM

The AMMO Chiefs Association Inc. has recently expanded their Legacy Memorial Paver Program to include all AMMO ranks. We call it - **AMMO ROAD** 

The price of the pavers is \$70. Our cost is \$65 per paver which is the reduced rate we negotiated and receive from the Airman Heritage Foundation (AHF). Any orders via our PayPal account should include the fees of \$2, so \$72 total. We receive no further reduction for multiple pavers. However, our pavers are grouped together, the first AFSC to do so.

This profit of \$5 per paver is used to fund a future AMMO Heritage Monument which has been discussed in the past year. The idea for a monument had such good favor with the past ACA that they put aside \$2,500 into a Certificate of Deposit for construction of this future memorial. This \$5 per paver while small, would see that \$2,500 start to grow. The ACA would continue to manage these funds until such time a formal organization is put into place to manage the AMMO Heritage Monument before funds are released.

There are 96 pavers purchased and 91 placed. CMSgt Mark Gossett recently added 4 pavers for A1C James Francis, A1C Frank Uhlic Jr., A1C James Reese, and SSgt Wilburn Vaught. The three AMMO troops, Uhlic, Reese and Vaught, were working nearby the revetment at Korat AB, Thailand that went low order and A1C Francis, an SP, attempted to save them, killing all four. The program has been a success and that is why we want to open it to all of AMMO.

All pavers are placed as ordered; there can be no reserved spaces or special grouping. Orders would remain "First in - First out". Order your own, one for a mentor you respected while on duty, a friend or a spouse. If you place an order and we find it is a duplicate, we will let you know.

We would reserve the right to ensure any wording is in accordance with the AHF guidelines and our requirement that the paver have some wording related to AMMO. Remember there are 3 lines of text limited to 14 characters per line including spaces. Acceptable entries might read AMMO (rank), IYAAYAS, KYPD, AMMO Wife, AMMO SPOUSE, etc. Something easily identifiable as AMMO related.

# Background

At the 2016 San Antonio Reunion ACA members toured The Airman Heritage Museum and later a recommendation was made to purchase a Lifetime Membership @ \$300 and receive a free single Legacy Paver.

Rather than a single one time donation via Lifetime membership, another proposal was made to create a new ACA tradition to perpetuate the memory of deceased ACA AMMO Chiefs.

The pavers are placed in a pathway that encircles the parade grounds at Lackland AFB in San Antonio Texas.

The purchase of Legacy Pavers supports the ACA Constitution and honors AMMO's heritage in a place highly visible to future Airmen and the public; it also supports the Airman Heritage Foundation long-term. Win/Win.





Initially the BOD agreed to purchase a Legacy Paver for all deceased ACA AMMO Chiefs then added all deceased ACA Members. Funding for all other previous AMMO Chiefs was funded by donations, most by ACA members. Several Chiefs have ordered their own.

The Program was adopted by the ACA BOD in mid-2017 and

started shortly after. The first batch was ordered in Nov

2017 with the first 44 being installed in the ground in May of 2019.





#### USAF Slashes Bomb Funding, Hinting at New Systems or Return to Boom and Bust

The Air Force slashed its request for most weapons in its fiscal 2022 budget request, while boosting its ask for longer-range, stealthy systems. The budget proposal indicates the service is either shifting away from short-range missiles and bombs or will soon find itself back in the boom-and-bust



munitions procurement cycle—or both.

The Air Force's request for Joint Direct Attack Munitions fell 88 percent, from 16,800 enacted in fiscal 2021 to 1,919 weapons in 2022. The high water mark of JDAM production was 30,872 units in 2019, meaning JDAM production for the Air Force will have fallen more than 93 percent in three years, if Congress goes along.

Most standard USAF munitions were requested at much smaller rates in the 2022 budget. Hellfire missile purchases would be reduced 74

percent; Small Diameter Bomb 1 would drop almost 60 percent; and Sidewinder and AMRAAM dogfight missiles would decline 27 percent and 37 percent, respectively, over enacted 2021 levels. Maj. Gen. James D. Peccia III, deputy assistant secretary for budget, told reporters at the budget rollout May 28 that the Air Force is "reducing munition procurements as the program approaches warfighter inventory objectives." The JDAM and SDB 1 "are at, or approaching, healthy inventory levels," he said, and the money saved by not buying as many of the extant weapons can be plowed back into advanced systems like the Joint Air-to-Surface Standoff Missile-Extended Range and hypersonics programs such as the AGM-183 Air-launched Rapid Response Weapon, or ARRW. An Air Force spokesperson said the Air Force is "comfortable" at the level of the weapon stockpile.

Along with other shifts in funding, the munitions buy seeks to modernize the fleet "for a high-end conflict in 2030 and beyond," Peccia said.

The only weapons USAF is asking to increase are the GBU-53 Stormbreaker (formerly the Small Diameter Bomb 2) and the AGM-158 JASSM-ER, which the Pentagon said is a crucial weapon due to its stealth and reach. Procurement of both weapons would be increased about 25 percent.

The Air Force is also working on a successor to the JDAM that would have longer range, reduced signature, and greater maneuvering capability to avoid terminal air defenses, about which the service declined to comment.

The JDAM and other cuts come just a year after Gen. Arnold W. Bunch Jr., head of Air Force Materiel Command, told Air Force Magazine he was hoping to end the "sine wave" cycle of boomand-bust weapons procurements, especially as the weapons accounts tend to be bill payers for other parts of the budget.

After the 2021 budget request was revealed, Bunch said USAF was able to "make a dent" in its yearslong munitions shortage, and the Air Force was on "a better trajectory" after preferred munitions were no longer being used at a high rate against ISIS in Iraq and Syria.

Bunch said he hoped to "level off" at the 2021 production rates, but that USAF was planning to change its weapons focus to "the high-end fight."

Former head of Air Combat Command retired Gen. James M. Holmes said last year that the Air Force meant to "start slowing down" on JDAM, both to pay for other weapons and focus on threats such as China, which require munitions having greater range and survivability. JDAM and Hellfire are direct-attack weapons with limited range.

The advantage of smoothing out munitions production would be to give Air Force planners and industry alike more predictability about weapons production and lower costs by making smarter decisions about workforce and materials.

A spokeswoman for Boeing, maker of the JDAM, said, "Our contracts with the U.S. Air Force allow for flexibility in annual orders," but the company declined to offer further comment.

Mark Gunzinger of AFA's Mitchell Institute for Aerospace Studies said USAF's move to increase the production of long-range systems at the expense of short-range ones is "exactly right" and "one of the few things I applaud in the Air Force's budget."

The JASSM-ER and other "mid-range standoff weapons are capable of penetrating contested areas and striking high value targets such as Chinese mobile missile launchers," and in the case of the Long-Range Anti-Ship Missile variant of JASSM, Chinese ships as well.



"JDAM and SDBs are great weapons, but they were never designed to survive" in an integrated air defense system, Gunzinger said.

Rather, the Air Force needs "fifthgeneration weapons for fifthgenerations platforms." He included on his short list of needed weapons the ARRW, of which the Air Force wants to build 12 in 2022 for \$141 million.

That said, the Mitchell Institute's analysis concludes that "USAF's planned inventory of JASSM and

LRASM could be depleted in a matter of days during a major conflict with China." Such systems have been "underfilled for years" by the Defense Department, and "it continues to do so, despite the fact that industry cannot quickly surge their production during a crisis."

Lockheed Martin Missiles and Fire Control, builder of the JASSM and LRASM, is building a new plant to handle expanded production of the weapons at its Troy, Alabama, location.

Gunzinger said the Air Force must "balance the range, size, cost, and cost-per-effect of its future weapons. Hypersonic weapons, he noted, have very long range and are highly survivable, "but they are too large to be carried in significant numbers per sortie and they cost too much to buy in large quantities," and so they may be "little more than niche weapons."

Michael White, DOD's lead for hypersonic systems, said in a Center for Strategic and International Studies program June 2 that the Pentagon aims to build hypersonic missiles "at scale," and this will become more possible when smaller, air-breathing hypersonic weapons become available. The ARRW and its counterparts in the Army and Navy tend to be large systems which can only be carried by bombers or fired by ships or heavy ground equipment.

The Air Force's first production numbers released for ARRW, contained in its 2022 budget request, peg the cost of the first tranche of usable missiles at \$13.4 million apiece.

A former senior defense official said recent Pentagon wargames showed that the winner in a Pacific conflict will be the side with the largest magazines of hypersonic missiles and noted there are "thousands of aimpoints" in the theater, requiring the weapons to be affordable.

Based on Gunzinger's analysis, "there is a sweet spot for munitions that have ranges between 65 miles and out to JASSM-ER's range," he said. Such mid-range weapons will "give penetrating aircraft enough standoff to avoid highest-risk point defenses surrounding high-value targets but won't be so large that they can't be carried internally by stealth aircraft." Gunzinger has suggested in previous studies that USAF would find value in modifying some existing weapons with a propulsion pack to extend their range and keep attack aircraft at a greater distance from air defenses.

The Air Force's budget request for conventional munitions basic research increased from \$127.1 million in 2021 to \$151.8 million in 2022. The request for applied research on conventional weapons increased from \$133.9 million in 2021 to \$157.4 million in 2022.
